CELESTE'S COMMUNICATIONS

Dear Members,

"We live in a wonderful world that is full of beauty, charm and adventure. There is no end to the adventures we can have if only we seek them with our eyes open." – **Jawaharal Nehru**

This month I just have to tell you all about my Alaskan adventure. It wasn't a cruise, although a boat and water was involved. Instead, it was an expedition. We started from Sitka, Alaska, visiting the raptor rescue center and a native American cultural center that had numerous totem poles on display. By the time we were set free to explore Sitka on our own, the one quilt shop in town had closed ☹️. We did walk through the Russian Orthodox church, however, before we headed to the National Geographic Sea Lion for boarding.

Our ship carried only 62 passengers and had only three decks. There were cabins, a lounge, a dining room and a small sun deck with three exercise machines. We had six experts in science and nature, a wellness specialist and a videographer. Each day, the ship would anchor somewhere in Alaska's Inside Passage and we would be transported to shore aboard Zodiac boats to either hike or kayak.

All hikes were led by one of the naturalists.

Now that I've set the stage, here are the details of what we saw: eleven grizzly bears near a waterfall the first day, sea otters, sea lions and puffins the next, the majesty of the Tongass National Forest, including some very old growth Sitka Spruce trees and even a wolf. One day our expedition leader altered the plan so we could experience fifteen or so whales bubble-feeding in Chatham Strait. On

Her individual stories for each quilt were interesting, and I could imagine each lady working on her own quilt. Paula said while she uses the many antique quilts in her collection for her inspiration, she does not try to copy the quilts exactly,

but adds her own touch. Class was very well attended with 17 ladies. We all had fun and got at least one block completed. Bonnie Blue is an easy quilt pattern and a good one for working on an accurate quarter inch seam. Paula provided additional tips and tidbits on English Paper Piecing, making 4-inch Star Blocks and 4-inch Dresden Plate Blocks and a fast way to do half-square triangles.

Remember, as part of being a member of the West Houston Quilter’s Guild, we are asked to make at least 2 quilts—1 for Linus and 1 for an adult in a nursing home. Pick up a kit and complete your quilt.

At the August guild meeting, the following items were turned in: 2 dresses, 5 Linus quilts, 1 crocheted quilt, 2 fleece quilts, 1 preemie, 1 adult quilt plus 1 crocheted quilt, 53 Christmas stockings, 3 cancer caps and 50 pediatric IV covers. Stocking kits will

be available at the September guild meeting—each kit makes 8 stockings.

Thanks to the generous donation of several bolts of flannel from Betty Baker, the Comfort Quilters have made 23 quilts for Linus. As soon as we can cut more yardage, we will make more quilts. Thanks, Betty.

Thursday morning at 3 AM, we were awakened by a PA announcement that the Aurora Borealis was putting on a great show, so we threw on some clothes and traipsed up to the bow to watch. WOW!

The boat paid a visit to Glacier Bay National Park, where we watch three glaciers calving (dropping large chunks of ice). Even more spectacular, however, was South Sawyer Glacier down Tracy Arm (very narrow so large cruise ships don't go very far into it). We offloaded onto the Zodiacs and were within ¼ mile of the glacier when a huge 20-story column of ice broke off the center, dropped into the water, then shot back up. Spectacular! And this was just the first week. We did stop at a small town called Petersburg where I found a quilt shop (open). I decided a good souvenir would be their row-by-row kit. It's various blue fabrics

with the Big Dipper and North Star – Alaska's flag.

After disembarking in Juneau, we flew to Anchorage, transferred to another flight and spent the night in Fairbanks. We stopped at a small visitor area and got a look at the Trans-Alaska Pipeline. Then it was a long bus trip to the entrance to Denali National Park, transfer to a modified school bus, and a 92-mile ride on that to the lodge that became our home for the next week. In Denali we did more hiking – again with trained guides – and more eating! Here everything was in miniature (think blueberry bushes only 6 inches high). We saw lots of caribou, moose, more grizzlies, Dall's sheep, many kinds of birds, and even a lynx, which is very rare to see. On Wednesday evening the sun finally came out so everyone left the dinner table to get our first look at Mt. McKinley in its 20,000 foot, snow-covered glory. We had one more day of hiking – this time in

the sun – and it was time to start our long journey home.

We loaded back on the school buses for our 92 mile ride back to the park entrance – four hours – and then boarded the Alaska Railroad for a seven hour trip back to Anchorage. I found another quilt store in Anchorage and bought one of their row-by-row kits, this one called Run, Salmon, Run (guess what's on it?)

One day of flying to get back to Seattle, then another day to get home to Houston and our adventure came to an end. Although the temperature change took a day to get used to (going from frost to 95 degrees), we're now back to normal, refreshed and ready to tackle the rest of 2015.

I hope you each had a chance for some travel and/or adventure this summer. Happy quilting everyone,

If you haven't already, you MUST turn in your challenge form to me BEFORE the September meeting begins. All participants MUST check in before the meeting. If you do not recall which UFOs you "registered" for the Challenge, feel free to email me (jkmquilting@gmail.com). The "reward" for the September turn-in is ready and awaiting its new home.....

“BARGELLO QUILTS WITH A TWIST” QUILT SUPPLY LIST

Basic sewing supplies (including thread, pins, scissors and seam ripper)
 Sewing machine in good working order
 Extension cord
 Iron and small ironing board (unless provided by workshop host)
 Rotary cutter, mat, and ruler (6” x 24” Omnigrid recommended)
 Batting for work-wall (36” x 36” is large enough)
 Notebook, pencil and colored pencils

Book – *Bargello Quilts with a Twist* by Maggie Ball (Krause Publications, 2008).
 Books available for purchase from Maggie at class and through store on website.

Fabric quantities are those needed to make the 16 blocks that we’ll work on during the workshop. Finished 16-block quilt with borders is approximately 36” x 36”. If you’d like to make a bigger quilt with 36, or 64 blocks, or you are taking this class for 2 or more days, you’ll need additional fabric...

- 8-10 fabrics – $\frac{1}{3}$ and $\frac{1}{2}$ yard pieces. Include a wide range of values from light to dark. A variety of print scales is also good. If you have trouble choosing, start with a multicolored theme print and add fabrics to go with it. Try to avoid a completely monochromatic selection.

Option – select a project from the book and substitute your own fabric choices. Fabric requirements for the projects are listed in the book.

RANDALL'S GOOD NEIGHBOR PROGRAM

Here is how you link your Randall's card to West Houston Quilter's Guild. This is the store's Good Neighbor program. Go to the customer service counter at your local store and ask that your card be linked to the number 11950.
